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Founded in 2001, the Raffles Institution String Ensemble (RISE) has provided many Rafflesians with the unique opportunity to develop their musical talent.

Currently consisting of 43 members, RISE is led by a dedicated team of three teachers, four Executive Committee members, and five Section Leaders.

We encourage Rafflesians with any sort of musical background to try out for RISE. The school will loan string instruments to those who do not own one, free of charge.

The Primary School Camp is an annual RISE initiative, where we reach out to Primary School musicians and give them the opportunity to play in an ensemble.





Our methods

A uniquely Rafflesian string ensemble.

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RISE (and most other String Ensembles) is composed of members who play 4 different instruments: the violin, the viola, the cello, and the double bass.

It also contains 5 Sections - in other words, 5 groups of musicians, who play 5 unique parts.

Here in RISE, our Executive Committee members and our Section Leaders readily provide personalised guidance to all budding musicians, facilitating growth both as a musician and as a Rafflesian.



Our process

Crafting the musical Rafflesian.

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Upon joining RISE, all Y1s will be initiated into the Training Ensemble, where they will develop the communication, coordination and teamwork skills necessary to play in an ensemble.

Following their first year in RISE, they will join their Y2-4 seniors by being inducted into the Main Ensemble, where they will flourish as musicians. Main Ensemble musicians will have the chance to perform and take part in VIA activites.

Musically gifted Y1s will bypass the Training Ensemble, directly entering the Main Ensemble.

Our environment

RISE is an extremely diverse CCA. We have musicians who had little experience with instruments prior to entering RISE, and we also have musicians who are part of the SNYO, or who have earned ABRSM/Trinity Diplomas.

Our expectations

Maintaining the high standards of RISE.

As the virtuoso violinist Pablo de Sarasate once said, "*For 37 years I've practiced fourteen hours a day, and now the public calls me a genius!*"

RISE musicians are expected to find time to practise their instruments on a daily basis. We believe in the benefits of practice. Technical skill can only be developed through hard work and dedication.



Further details

The where, the when, and the how.

CCA sessions take place in the first floor of the ArtSpace, within facilities specially designed for music practice.

RISE conducts sessions on Mondays and Wednesdays, from 4:00pm to 6:15pm.

Mondays are *tutti* sessions, where the entire ensemble gathers together and plays as one, while Wednesdays are sectional sessions, where each Section gathers to practice its individual part.

A handful of our musicians are new to playing an instrument. In such cases, the school will loan an instrument of good quality to the student in question. He will have to be responsible for his own instrument.



Resilience: How we adjusted to Covid-19

Covid-19 Measures

Adapting to a new era.

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We shifted our training sessions to the online medium of Microsoft Teams.

Our seniors independently conducted online training sessions with our juniors.

Our Exco created practice guides and infographics to inform us about the context of our pieces.

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When face-to-face CCA started, we changed seating arrangements and provided all RISE members with a personal music stand.



We made sure that all chairs and music stands were wiped down with disinfectant every CCA session.



Frequently Asked Questions

Is there a minimum grade to enter RISE?

No, there is not! As previously mentioned, all Rafflesians with a musical background are welcome to audition for RISE. We will warmly welcome all potential applicants.

Yes, they are! Upon entry to RISE, they will be loaned an instrument for free, which they will have the chance to learn over the course of their 4 years in RISE.

When newcomers first enter RISE, they might find the unfamiliar ensemble setting rather intimidating. However, after adjusting themselves to CCA life, they will find that RISE is one of the least stressful CCAs in the school. In fact, many musicians find that playing their instruments is a good outlet to relieve stress.
